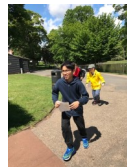

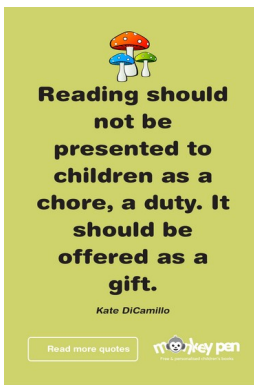
The **Big** Question for the Summer Term Assessment Period — How do I make Good Decisions?

All Things Reading

Many of you will, I hope, remember that when I first meet you, just prior to when your child starts school I talk about how as parents we should want our children to succeed where we have failed—to do better in life than us.

With the older children in assembly on Monday, I talked about the importance of reading and how the amount children read, really can impact on what they want to achieve in life.

I shared the table below with them, which although a little old, does show how children who read regularly are far more likely to succeed.

Table 1: Enjoyment of reading and reading attainment in 2012 (N = 13,710)

| | Below expected level % | At expected level % | Above expected level % |
|-------------|------------------------|---------------------|------------------------|
| Very much | 2.4 | 63.5 | 34.2 |
| Quite a lot | 4.2 | 83.5 | 12.3 |
| A bit | 17.4 | 75.8 | 6.8 |
| Not at all | 37.0 | 54.9 | 8.1 |

Fully appreciating that we constantly go on about reading but in the words of LeBron James, 'reading actually benefits athletes tremendously and books have become an essential part of his own pregame ritual'.

It is now a proven scientific fact that reading regularly enhances your ability to think on your feet and solve problems more quickly. And it's not just your English skills that it helps. Books and reading are shown to help you get better at loads of other subjects, including maths.
